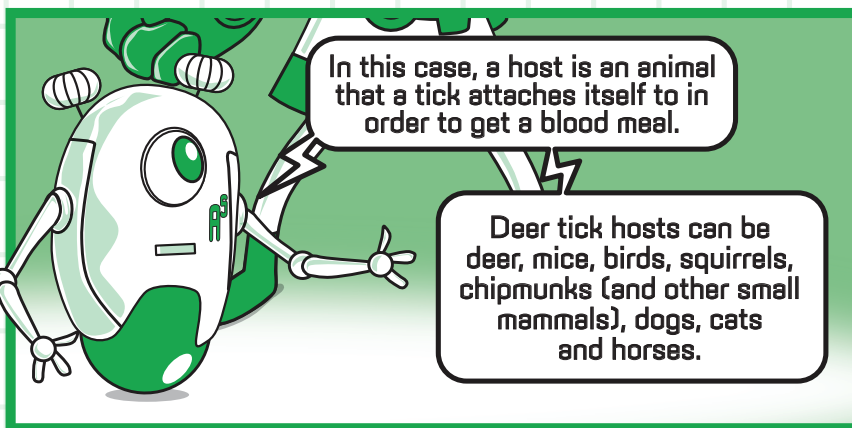
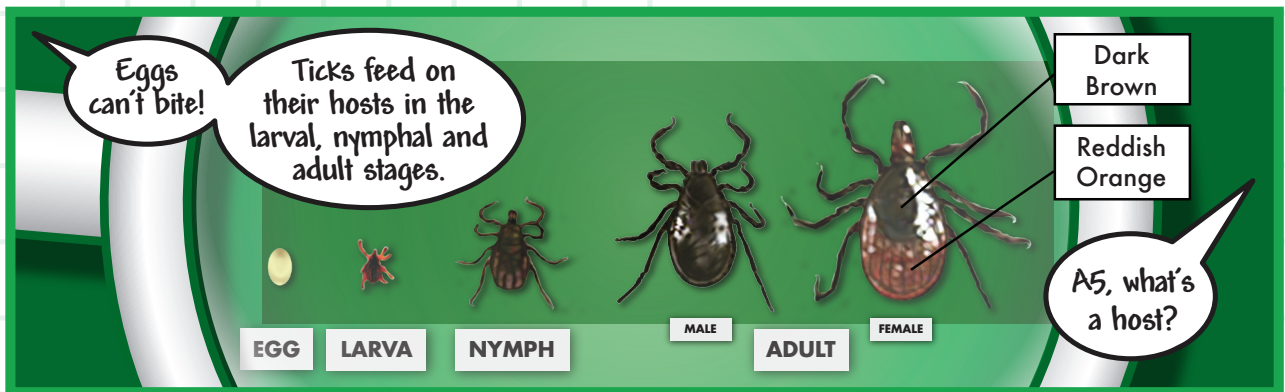
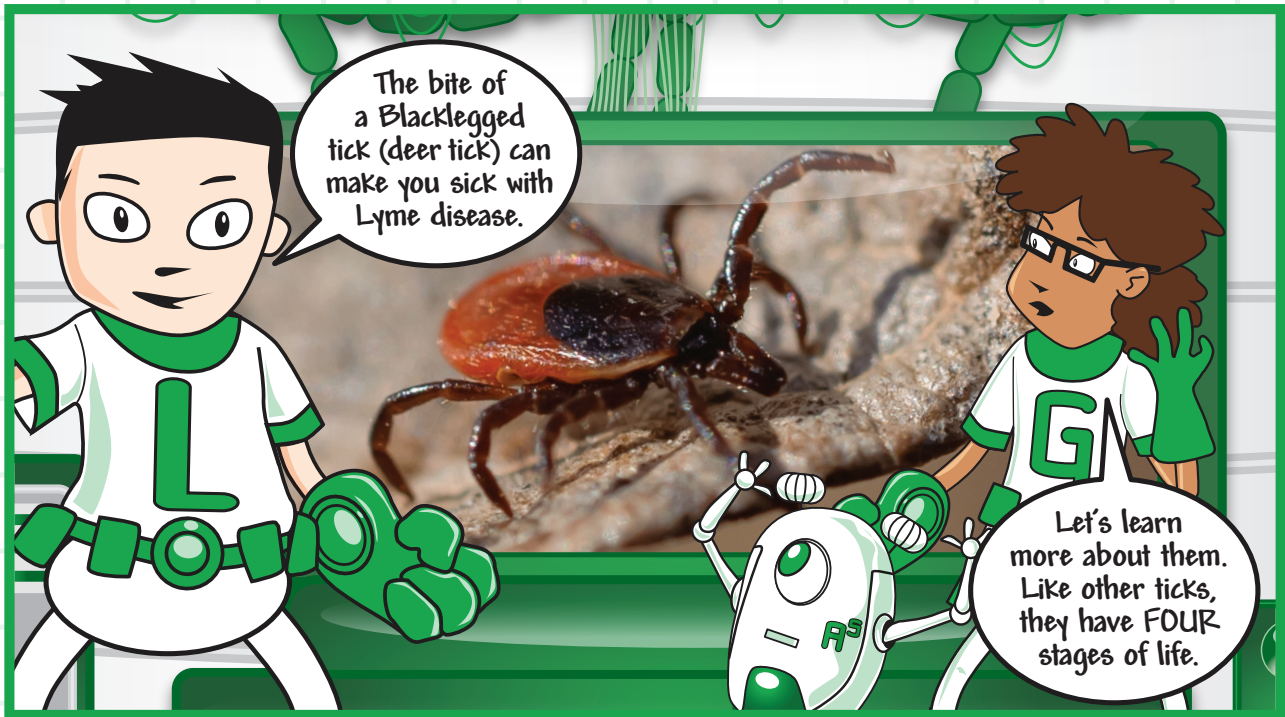
Ticks are pretty fascinating creatures. They have been crawling the earth for **millions of years!** Did you know that a female tick can lay **up to 3,000 eggs** in her lifetime? That's a big family.

There are about **900** species of ticks in the world, and **over 90** of those live in the continental U.S.* Not all ticks carry diseases, but **some can make you very sick if they bite you.**

This guide will teach you how to **avoid ticks**, and **what to do** if you've been **exposed to a dangerous tick.**

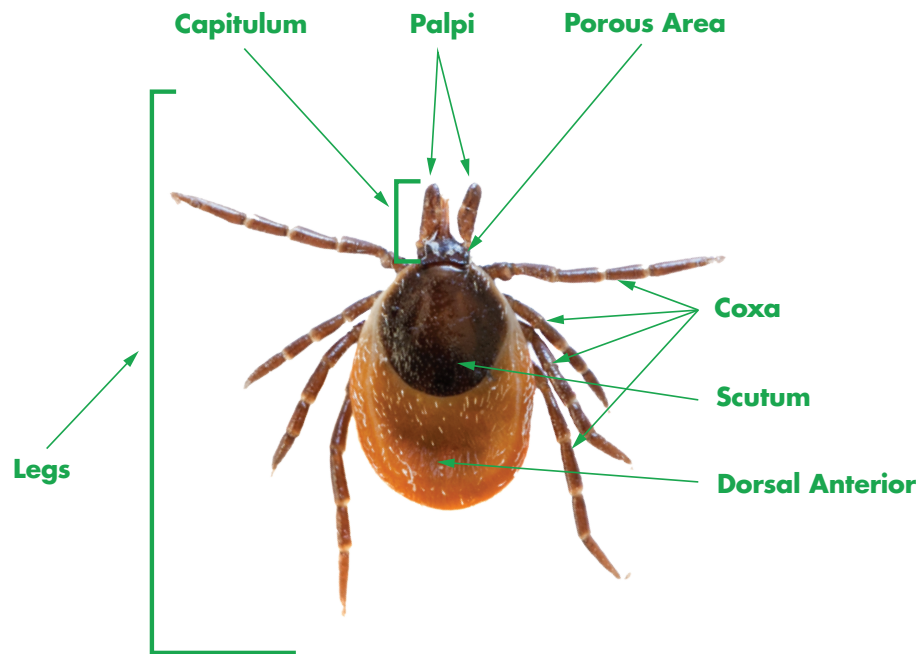


Anatomy of a Tick

The body of a tick consists of a "false head" (the capitulum) and a single oval, flattened body. A larval tick has six legs, while nymphs and adults have eight legs like spiders and mites (insects have six legs).

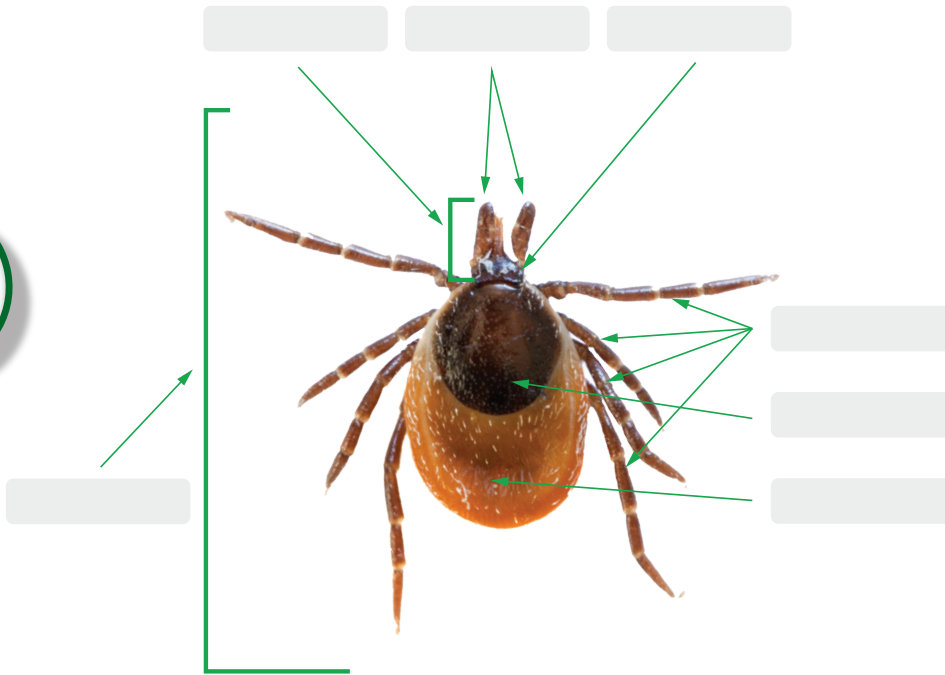
Female Ixodid Tick

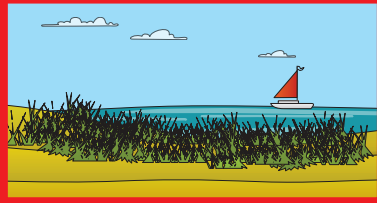

Beach grass

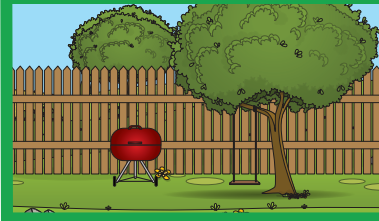


Warm, wet grounds covered with bushes and wet leaves

Clean yard with short grass

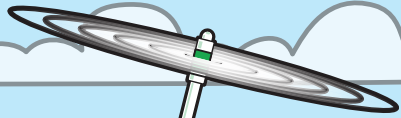
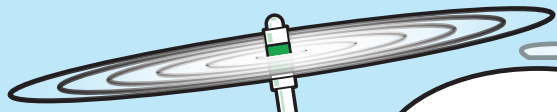


Open shorelines with sandy beaches

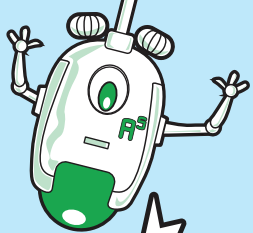
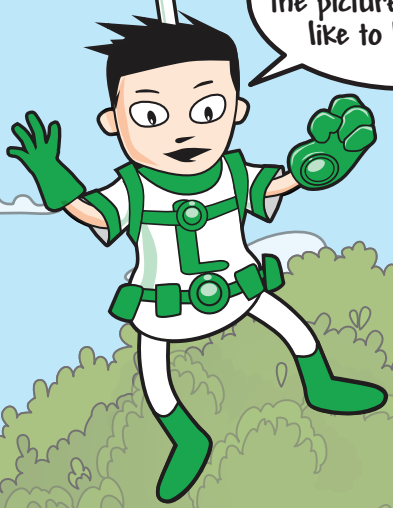


Sports fields with short grass



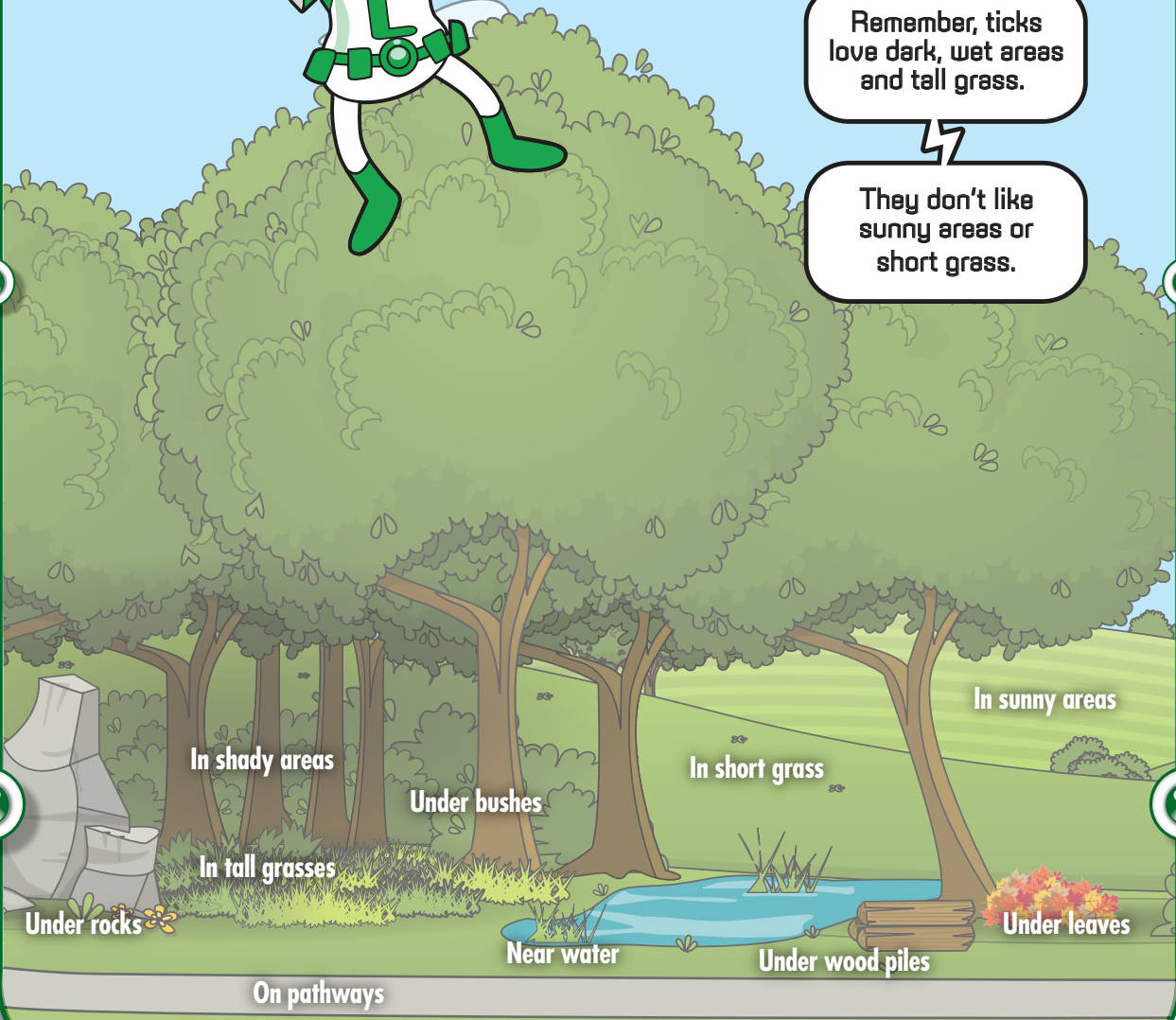


Circle the 7 areas in the picture where ticks like to hang out.

It's very important that you tell your parents or a trusted adult right away if you see any type of rash.

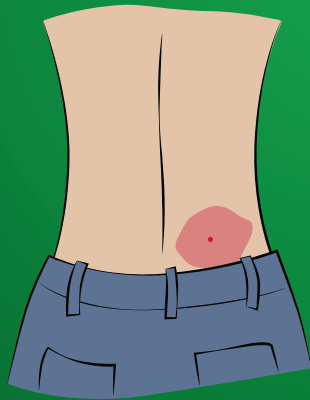
